Editor's note: This is another in a series of articles about AOL Alumnae Board members.

I played on AOL's volleyball and basketball teams as a student. And I played on the school's first softball team as well, competing against other area schools—Visitation, Mercy, Aquinas—at city parks.

I can remember practicing softball after school in my uniform on the lawn between Hackman and Aquinas Halls. The Sisters didn't want us to wear slacks for our games, but eventually they allowed us to wear white pants and yellow shirts. "Oh, my," my mother said when she heard about the white pants.

I also sang alto in the glee club and played clarinet in AOL's orchestra. We played every year for graduation, except our own. But we wore our caps and gowns to play on Honors Day. I liked math and science, particularly algebra with **Sister Mechtilde**. I also studied advanced algebra, geometry and—during summer school at St. Rita's—trigonometry. My science classes were biology, chemistry and physics.

After graduating from AOL, I studied accounting and bookkeeping at Fox Secretarial College while working for Harris Trust. In 1956 I married Jerry Malone and we had seven children. While raising my family, I also served as president and treasurer of the bowling league sponsored by St. Denis Church and as president, treasurer and secretary of Maria High School's Mothers Club. After my husband died in 1981, I worked for a florist and became active in the Widow or Widower (W.O.W.) group at St. Michael's Church in Orland Park, serving as treasurer and president as well as chairperson of the Family and Children's Group. Eventually, I formed a W.O.W. group for St. Anthony's parish in Frankfort. I moved recently to New Lenox, and am now a member of the Council of Catholic Women at St. Jude's parish. I'm the grandmother of 19 and have one great-grandchild.

I chose to serve on the AOL Alumnae Board to give a little back to the school that gave me so much.



A MUDDY "BAPTISM" INITIATED HER AOL YEARS

Editor's note: In the last issue of the Longwood Update, we reported in error that Jane Greene Hansen '28 had died. Jane, thank heaven, is alive and well, residing in a retirement home in Beverly. She recently shared some of her memories of AOL.

The first days of high school are always an adventure, but for **Jane Greene Hansen**, one was memorable. The first day she wore her uniform, her friends dared her to walk across the lagoon, which appeared to have no water in it. Alas, she found a wet spot to slip and fall on, thus muddying up her uniform.

That was in the autumn of 1924. And during her years at AOL, Jane collected many memories more pleasant than her initial encounter with the lagoon.

There were 75 girls in her class, she said, some of whom were boarders. Those girls, many from Wisconsin and Indiana, resided in the Administration Building. Along with several other girls, Jane rode the train every day from Blue Island to the 95th Street station near Longwood Drive, then walked east to AOL. (And she had perfect attendance for four years!) She enjoyed English and algebra, but not geometry.

Students were instructed to use the Throop Street door (definitely not the 95th Street door!). Rouge—makeup of any kind—was strictly forbidden, as was smoking anywhere on the premises.

Hackman Hall, Jane recalled, was built while she was an AOL student. She graduated from its auditorium in 1928, among the first to hear the strains of "Pomp and Circumstance" there. Jane remembers **S. Mary Leo Hackman**, a music teacher, whose family was a major contributor to the conservatory building.

Some of the teachers Jane remembers are **S. Raphael**, a chemistry teacher, **Sisters Canisia, Patricia** and **Loretta**, English teachers. **S. Humilis, S. Thecla** and **S. Elizabeth** were also among her teachers.

Social events in her day were limited to the junior and senior proms, held in the gym. Among her special extracurricular involvements was taking part in the senior play, "Snow White and Rose Red." She played the role of a woman selling groceries. She also remembers traveling downtown with a group of students and a Sister chaperone to attend the Eucharistic Congress at Soldier Field in 1925. All the Longwood students wore white dresses trimmed in yellow, the school colors.

Among Jane's good friends and classmates were **Bernice Schuba La Franchise, S. Clare (Irene)**

AOL WAS AN EARLY CHAPTER IN THIS ALUM'S "AUTOBIOGRAPHY"

Marcy Miller was the senior alumna at last fall's AOL Reunion. So the *Longwood Update* thought it would be interesting to ask her to relate a few memories of her time at Longwood.

Her first memory is of going to the front door on 95th Street to register for high school and being told by a Sister that she should go around to the side door on Throop Street to register for the grade school. At 13 Marcy was 4'1" tall. She grew to a height of 4'11" while at AOL. But she remained the shortest girl in her class, so she was always first in line and she led her classmates into Hackman Hall from the campus on graduation day.

Between registration and graduation, Marcy most enjoyed English, history and the arts, but she struggled with math. Sewing also was a trial for her, an embarrassment because her mother was a milliner. One of her teachers told her she had prayed to God to help her give Marcy a fair grade

Presenting an oral book report might terrify some people, but not **Marcella Allely Miller '28**. She has reviewed scores of books for organizations over the years, and she still looks back in gratitude to her parents and her AOL teachers for encouraging her love of reading. She also thanks her singing teacher, Mr. Canterbury. "He taught me to breathe correctly," she says. It's an ability very important in public speaking.

because she was "such a nice little girl." The minimum passing grade was 70-75. The grade Marcy received was 57. She laughs at the memory: "Imagine what it would have been without Sister's prayers!"

Marcy also studied piano and had roles in the school plays. She received a gold medal for elocution. She remembers a jolly Sister—"Sister Raphael, perhaps?"—singing "Moonlight and Roses" and other songs with the girls at a piano in the old wooden building next to the main building. And during Saturday classes in a studio next to Sister Stanisla's portrait studio, Marcy learned to paint china plates. Two of Marcy's art teachers (one a traditionalist, the other having more contemporary taste) would argue about their conflicting views on floral designs for the plates. Their student would at times carry messages between the feuding artists. Another Sister would fire the hand-painted plates in a kiln away from the studio. China painting, Marcy recalls, "introduced me to another form of art"—not to mention teaching her that even Sisters argue at times.

Marcy's family lived in South Shore while she attended AOL. She took three streetcars to get to school,

then walked from 95th and Vincennes. Her friends in school included **Helen Tetu**, **Marguerite Torpey** (later **Sister Alphonse Marie, SSND**) and **Mary Jane Willcockson O'Connor**. Freshman year her school uniform was a navy blue, heavy wool dress, but in her second year, the uniform was made with a softer fabric and pleated. The boarders, she recalls, had a duplicate uniform in black for Sundays.

After graduating from AOL, Marcy attended DePaul University, graduating with a business degree in 1932. Until she married her husband, Arthur, she worked at the John Hancock Insurance Co. at 1 N. LaSalle St., always wearing a hat and white gloves to the office.

While living in Beverly, Marcy joined a book club that met at the Castle at 103rd and Longwood Drive. This activity led to reviewing and the opportunity to audition before the Conference of Club Presidents and Program Chairmen. She was accepted as a book reviewer and thus began many years of speaking for a fee about books at libraries and women's organization meetings across the Chicago area.

Marcy's daughter, **Maria Miller Delsing**, attended AOL, graduating in 1960. Maria is a teacher, now working toward a second master's degree. Marcy also has two sons, James and Richard.

After 25 years in Beverly, Marcy has lived for 36 years in Frankfort, a location chosen for its proximity to a golf course. Her husband loved golf. Arthur died in 1993.

Marcy remains active in her condo community, where she organizes weekly bridge games, and in her parish, St. Anthony's, where she serves as a Communion minister. In fact, in honor of her birthday on May 6, the pastor interrupted Mass to present her with a sterling silver Sacred Heart medal. The congregation sang "Happy Birthday."

Kloeckner, SSND, and **S. Alphonse Marie (Marguerite) Torpey, SSND**. The two Sisters later taught at the Academy. **S. Anita Heffron, SSND**, also was a longtime friend.

After graduating from AOL, Jane attended business classes at DePaul University in Chicago, then worked in a bank until she married her husband, George. She quit at that point because the bank would not allow married women to work. They continued to live in Blue Island. George died at 59.

Jane continued her interest in Longwood long after her graduation, especially when her daughters were AOL students. **Loretta Hansen Finlayson '55** and **Mary Beth Hansen Given '57** keep in close touch with their mother.

Reflecting on her memories of the beauty of the AOL campus and the Blessed Mother grotto is only part of Jane's life today, though. She's an avid reader, and she enjoys a number of other activities offered by her current home. She spends quite a bit of time in the computer room, sending and receiving e-mail and researching topics that interest her.

Sister Isaac Jogues Rousseau, SSND, a former Latin teacher at AOL who now lives in Milwaukee, has been elected to the Green Bay Packers FAN Hall of **Fame**. Sister I.J., who also taught at Mount Mary College, was born in Green Bay, WI, in 1921, the year the Packers entered the National Football League.

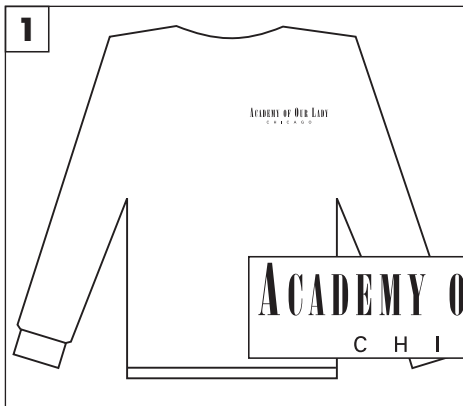
